What Psychiatrists Say about Goldwater:

- "B.G. is in my opinion emotionally unstable, immature, volatile, unpredictable, hostile, and mentally unbalanced. He is totally unfit for public office and a menace to society..."
- "My clinical impression is that he is a paranoid personality with dominance of subjective views over objective...."
- "His two 'nervous breakdowns' absolutely disqualify him for office, for these have a marked tendency to recur even after the lapse of decades. . . ."
- "While I heartily believe that we should hire the handicapped, I hardly think that a man who has suffered two nervous breakdowns should be given the job of President as occupational therapy."
- "It would appear that Barry had a stronger identification with his mother than with his father. . . ."
- "His theme is 'freedom'—but from what? Unconsciously, it seems to be from his mother's domination..."
- "B.G.'s proneness to aggressive behavior and destructiveness indicates an attempt to prove his manliness. . . ."

- "Inwardly he is a frightened person who sees himself as weak and threatened by strong virile power around him—and his call for aggressiveness and the need for individual strength and prerogatives is an attempt to defend himself against and to deny his feelings of weakness and danger. . . ."
- "Since his nomination I find myself increasingly thinking of the early 1930s and the rise of another intemperate, impulsive, counterfeit figure of a masculine man, namely, Adolf Hitler. . . ."
- "Unconsciously he seems to want to destroy himself. He has a good start, for he has already destroyed the Republican party. . . ."
- "He consciously wants to destroy the world with atomic bombs. He is a mass-murderer at heart and a suicide. He is amoral and immoral. A dangerous lunatic!"
- "Goldwater is a man of low character, a coward, weak, insecure, confused, with no constructive social program and no understanding for the needs of mankind. A man who has mocked the ideals of his ancestors, a Jew who is refusing to other minorities the same elementary civil rights for which his ancestors fought, died, or were exiled, a man so cowardly that he has identified with his hereditary tormentors and strives to become one of them. . . . He would be a calamity to himself, to his friends, and to humanity if he ever becomes President of the U.S.A."
- "As a human being he is to be pitied. As President of the United States he would be a disaster. . . ."










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

My dear Sir:

On behalf of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, I write to ask that a Committee on Woman Suffrage be appointed in the House of Representatives as in the Senate of the Congress of the United States. We make this request because the Judiciary Committee, to which constitutional amendments are referred, is and always has been so occupied with other important questions, that it has never been able to give the consideration due to this measure, supported by so large a portion of our people.

May I remind you that the national governments of Great Britain, France and Russia have promised woman suffrage in the near future; and that the greater part of Canada has already established it within a few months. The leaders of these governments have announced that the vote has been or will be given to their women in recognition of the devotion, sacrifice, skill and endurance of women in their varied service to their country under the strain of war. Our Republic stands upon the threshold of what may prove the severest test of loyalty and endurance our country has ever had. It needs its women; and they are ready -- as fearless, as willing, as able, as loyal as any women of

JOINT RESOLUTION

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Our poor, neglected and battered Constitution has just been dealt another body blow, by a faithless Congress and a faithless Supreme Court.

Section 1 of Article II provides:

The President "shall be elected as follows: Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature may direct, a number of electors", etc.

Section 1 of Article I:

"The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several States, and the electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislature."

Amendment XVII: "The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof. . . . The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislature."

Congress is given authority to change the times, places and manner of holding elections for Senators and Representatives. This cannot apply in any respect other than to method, which does not have anything to do with qualifications for voting.

It could not be stated in plainer language that the qualifications for voting are to be as established by each State for itself. The Congress and the Supreme Court have chosen to ignore the explicit terms, emphasized by the word "shall", and the court has again unwarrantedly departed from its judicial function to act in a legislative capacity. The plain words of the Constitution have been violated so wantonly and flagrantly by those sworn to observe them that the five Justices responsible for the decision should be impeached forthwith and Congress should repeal the 18 years voting act.

Dear Congressman Celler:

I have your letter of February 24 requesting my views on H.J.Res. 223, a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States. The proposed amendment would, as I understand it: (1) prohibit the denial of the vote, on grounds of age, in any American election (federal, or state [or subdivision thereof]), to any citizen of the United States eighteen years of age or older; and (2) confer on Congress the authority to enact legislation to enforce this prohibition.

I am happy to endorse the proposed amendment. It seeks to accomplish a very important national purpose -- the extension of the franchise in all elections to millions of American citizens fully qualified to participate in the political processes of the nation and the states. And it seeks to accomplish this purpose in what I believe to be the one proper way to proceed -- amending the Constitution.

One year ago I argued that Congress lacked power to accomplish this purpose by statute, and that to attempt to do so would prove an error of constitutional dimension. To be sure, I did not foresee the result reached in United States v. Arizona, in which a majority of the Court upheld the 1970 statute insofar as it lowered the voting age for federal elections, while a different majority invalidated the statute insofar as it sought to lower the voting age for non-federal elections. That result seems to me, with all respect, to be anomolous; but, whatever view be taken of the result and the arguments advanced in support thereof, the Court's judgment makes it unmistakably clear that the only way federal law can affect the voting age in state (and local -- i.e., state subdivision) elections is through amendment to the Constitution.

For the reasons set forth above, I hope that Congress votes to submit H.J. Res. 223 to the legislatures of the states for speedy ratification.

Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States extending the right to vote to citizens eighteen years of age or older.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

"ARTICLE -

"Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age. "Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."
